on't be fooled. The coronavirus pandemic is deadly serious, and it's everyone's problem. It's hard to believe, but just in days, normal life around the globe has ground to a halt. Businesses deemed nonessential by the government are closed or closing. Classrooms sit empty. Streets are eerily quiet and freeways unimaginably clear. Most of the state's millions of residents are now under orders to remain in their homes for the coming weeks at least in an extraordinary attempt to slow the relentless march of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The coronavirus is a problem for everyone. Not just for people over 65 (who, so far, have made up the majority of deaths worldwide). And not just for people with chronic conditions or compromised immune systems who are at higher risk for serious illness. In fact, all adults are at some risk. (Happily, young children continue to be spared the worst of the infection.) As it turns out, large number of the people hospitalized with coronavirus infections in Europe and U.S. are non-boomers between the ages of 20 and 54, and since most of them are still sick, we can't say for sure how they will fare in the long

Social distancing and home isolation are the best tools we have at the moment to slow or even stop transmission, while we continue to search for vaccines, treatments and the resources to keep our healthcare system working. That's what we are learning from China's early experience managing the outbreak. The country quickly instituted strict quarantine rules for millions of people, and on Friday, Chinese officials reported for the second day in a row that they'd gone without any new cases of locally transmitted COVID-19.

t the invitation of H.E. Xi Jinping, President of the People's Republic of China, H.E. Dr. Arif Alvi, President of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, visited China from 16-17 March 2020. The President was accompanied by the Foreign Minister, Minister for Planning Development and Special Initiatives, and senior officials. During the visit, President Dr. Arif Alvi met with President Xi Jinping. Premier Li Keqiang and Chairman National People's Congress, Li Zhanshu, also met President Dr. Arif Alvi.

Given the depth and breadth of Pakistan-China ties and the finest traditions of both countries to always stand by each other particularly in challenging times, President Dr. Arif Alvi's first visit to Beijing was a singular expression of Pakistan's solidarity with its "iron brother." Both sides reaffirmed their support on issues concerning each other's core national interests. The Chinese side reiterated solidarity with Pakistan in safeguarding its territorial sovereignty, independence and security. The Pakistan side reaffirmed its commitment to the One-China Policy and underscored that affairs related to Hong Kong and Taiwan were China's internal affairs. Pakistan underscored that the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), a signature

Both sides expressed satisfaction over the close cooperation at multilateral fora and resolved to deepen strategic coordination, consultation and communication. Both sides reaffirmed their commitment to the purposes and principles of the UN Charter, and support for multilateralism and win-win cooperation.

Both sides exchanged views on the situation in Jammu & Kashmir. The Pakistan side briefed the Chinese side on the latest developments, including its concerns, position, and current urgent issues. The Chinese side underscored that it was paying close attention to the current

akistan strongly condemns and rejects the latest Indian action aimed at illegally changing the demographic structure of the Indian occupied Jammu & Kashmir (IOJ&K). The so-called "Jammu and Kashmir Reorganization Order 2020" is another illegal step by India to settle non-Kashmiris in IOJ&K by changing the domicile laws. This is a clear violation of international law, including the 4th Geneva Convention.

This Indian action, a continuation of India's illegal and unilateral steps since 5 August 2019, also constitutes a violation of the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) Resolutions, bilateral agreements between India and Pakistan, and humanitarian norms.

The latest Indian action, at this moment of global health crisis, is particularly reprehensible as it seeks to take advantage of the international community's focus on the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic and further advance BJP's sinister, "Hindutva" agenda.

Pakistan has been consistently sensitizing the international community about the BJP Government's designs for demographic change in IOJ&K to perpetuate India's illegal occupation of the disputed territory, manifestly against the wishes and aspirations of the Kashmiri people.

The United Nations and the international community must take immediate cognizance of this Indian action, prevent India from changing the demography of the occupied territory, and hold India accountable for its persistent violations of international law.

On its part, Pakistan will continue to highlight India's state terrorism in IOJ&K,and its denial of the fundamental freedoms and inalienable right to self-determination of the Kashmiri people.No matter what its tactics, India will never be able to break the will of the Kashmiri people. Nor will India succeed in its nefarious designs to subjugate the Kashmiris against their wishes.



Pakistan PM urges US to halt sanctions on coronavirus-hit Iran

rime Minister Imran Khan called on the international community to remove sanctions on Iran, enabling the neighbouring country to better deal with the novel coronavirus crisis.

"I would stress and insist the international community to lift the sanctions on Iran. It is very unjust they are dealing with such a large outbreak on one side, and on the other they are facing international sanctions," said Mr Khan at a press briefing according to AFP.

Iran's President Hassan Rouhani had last week written letters to his counterparts across the world including Prime Minister Khan informing them how his country's fight against Covid-19 was being impaired by the US sanctions. He had urged other countries to stop observing the American sanctions against his country. Iranian Foreign Minister Javad Zarif, too, wrote to UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres demanding that the US curbs be removed.

Describing the situation in Iran as "dire". Foreign Minister Shah Mehmood Qureshi also called for removal of US sanctions to help Tehran fight the pandemic and save lives. "The entire global community is fighting an unprecedented pandemic. We must, as leaders at time of such great challenge & difficulty, show utmost compassion. Sanctions must be lifted against

Iran, in this moment of peril so that it can use its resources to save precious human lives." Mr Qureshi tweeted.

iting Iranian statistics, according to which one person in Iran dies from Covid-19 every 10 minutes and 50 others get infected with virus every hour, he said the situation was "dire". Till Friday, 1,433 people in Iran had lost their lives because of Covid-19 pandemic while 19,644 people had been infected by the virus according to the Iranian health ministry.

Iran's embassy in Islamabad, meanwhile, in a statement said US sanctions against Iran were obstructing the Iranian efforts to contain the disease and warned that this could imperil the health of citizens of other countries in the region.

"These sanctions are not only against humanitarian norms of international law and judgments of the International Court of Justice, rather depriving of Iran from access to medicine, medical equipment and violates the rights of access to health care and right of life for the people of Iran. In view of its contagious character and guick outbreak of the virus, the sanctions will endanger health security of all the regional countries and the world," the embassy warned.

The embassy said that Iran despite being among top 10 countries of the world leading in specialized health care was facing shortage of special protective dresses and equipment. which left medical personnel in Iran more vulnerable while confronting this disease and several of them fell victim to it.

Tehran argues that US sanctions deprive Iran of access to its financial resources in the foreign countries and utilization of exports earnings, which in turn impairs production and import of equipment, items and medicines, treatment of patients, transfer of technology and research all of which require huge financial resources.

However, US rejected the Iranian demand for lifting of curbs telling the Iranian leaders that the spread of the coronavirus would not save it from the sanctions that are choking off its oil revenues and isolating its economy. "Our policy of maximum pressure on the regime continues," said Brian Hook, the US Special Representative for Iranian Affairs, according to Reuters.

The US on Wednesday imposed additional sanctions on Iran targeting nine entities based in South Africa, Hong Kong, and China as well as three Iranian individuals.

Iranian Ambassador to Pakistan Seyed Mohammad Ali Hosseini also wrote a letter to Leader of Opposition in the National Assembly Shahbaz Sharif, urging him to help build pressure for lifting of sanctions.

Afghanistan's peace process is in danger of unravelling

The COVID-19 crisis and the Ghani-Abdullah dispute could bring down the fragile peace in the country

hose of us who witnessed United States officials and Taliban representatives shake hands on February 29, 2020, were inspired by the political will for peace that we witnessed. Yet many of us have also recognised the inevitable difficulties in implementing the agreement concluded in Doha. But what we could not have anticipated was the two crises which would simultaneously threaten to derail the entire Afghan peace process: the Afghan

presidential election dispute and the COVID-19 pandemic.

So far, Afghanistan has registered 170 cases of COVID-19 and four deaths. While these numbers are low compared with what is reported from the worst-affected countries such as Italy, Spain, Iran, and the United States, given the limited testing capacity in Afghanistan, it is feared that the true scope of the outbreak is much bigger.

Afghanistan's health system is underdeveloped and unable to cope with a large-scale pandemic. There are persistent problems with water, sanitation and hygiene and many Afghans live in communally shared, crowded spaces. This means that self-isolation, social distancing, and hygiene measures will be less effective.

Some may point out that Afghanistan's geography and the extreme isolation of some communities will likely slow down the spread of COVID-19. While that may help, there is an increasing flow of Afghan refugees departing Iran and returning to provinces across the country, which could accelerate the spread of the virus.

Since late February, almost 100,000 of the three million Afghans living in Iran have travelled home, with around 15,000 crossing on a daily basis in March, in spite of Afghan government pleas to Tehran to close the border. While the February 29 agreement between the US and the Taliban has likely encouraged some Afghan refugees to return, the large-scale movement is driven more by the spread of the coronavirus in Iran and the severe economic crisis, exacerbated by the US policy of maximum pressure.

Those Afghan refugees are returning to a country gridlocked by a political crisis, with President Ashraf Ghani and Dr Abdullah Abdullah stuck in a dispute over the results of the September 28 presidential election. Both leaders have held separate presidential inauguration ceremonies threatening to split the country.

Amid the crisis, on March 23, US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo issued a damning statement, expressing the US disappointment by the failure of the Afghan leadership to reach an agreement. Considering this "to poses a direct threat to US national interests". Pompeo announced a reduction of US spending in Afghanistan by \$1bn this year and \$1bn in 2021. This move is intended to put pressure on Ghani and Abdullah to put aside their differences and form a unity government.

Yet if this strategy proves ineffective, there is a real risk of a collapse of political order in Kabul, as the Afghan state is deeply dependent on foreign aid, which accounts for 40 percent of gross domestic product (GDP).

The crisis could be compounded by an early withdrawal of US and NATO troops. Four NATO service members who recently arrived in Afghanistan have tested positive for coronavirus; and given fears of a major outbreak in the

country, Western allies may decide to pull their troops out ahead of the schedule set by the US-Taliban agreement. The rapid scaling down of the foreign military presence in Afghanistan could precipitate a major security vacuum and encourage the Taliban to break the agreement and escalate their military campaign again. It is also likely to enable even more attacks by the Islamic State in Khorasan. On March 25, its fighters laid an hours-long siege on a Sikh religious complex in Kabul, killing 25 people.

The coronavirus outbreak could also affect efforts to push forward intra-Afghan talks by foreign mediators. Face-to-face negotiations will likely cease as they bring risks to all those involved. Furthermore, while the intra-Afghan talks to be effective should be as inclusive as possible, consulting at all levels of Afghan society, if the peace process does indeed proceed then it will likely be confined to a very narrow, top-down negotiation between an Afghan negotiating team and the Taliban.

There are, however, reasons for cautious optimism.

Intra-Afghan negotiations continue, albeit not in the form imagined just a few weeks ago. On March 22, Qatar and the US facilitated technical talks addressing prisoner releases between the Afghan government and the Taliban via Skype. This demonstrates that the coronavirus has not brought diplomacy to a complete halt. The seriousness and intensity with which Secretary Pompeo and Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad have engaged with the Afghan political crisis and faltering peace process over the past weeks, conducting many face-to-face meetings at the start of a global lockdown, also shows that more traditional forms of diplomacy will continue out of necessity. It is also conceivable that the coronavirus could help establish further forms of cooperation between the Afghan government and the Taliban. For this to happen, the Taliban must first accept reality: the virus will spread to all of Afghanistan and will affect all Afghans, regardless of faith, political allegiance and ethnicity.

By working together with all parties to combat coronavirus, the Taliban could show the world that it can conduct itself as a responsible power-sharing partner in any post-settlement Afghanistan. The Taliban have made tentative steps in the right direction on this front: they have reconciled with the International Committee of the Red Cross and restored security guarantees for its personnel. It is high time to do the same in all areas they control and allow in emergency health responders. So far, the Taliban have been hedging their bets on US President Donald Trump's urgent need for a diplomatic victory in an election year. In the context of the current pandemic, the Taliban need to understand that if Trump is pushed too far, he could decide that money spent in Afghanistan is better spent at home and under emergency legislation withdraw all US forces. While the Taliban may initially perceive this to be a victory, it would be a pyrrhic one. A security vacuum will not pave the way for the re-establishment of the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan; it will only plunge the country into long and bloody conflict.

Rather than exploit the gridlock in Kabul to advance militarily, the Taliban should maintain their reduction in violence and assist in a united front against the Islamic State. The Taliban should heed the call of UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres for a global ceasefire and ensure a level of stability in Afghanistan so the country has a better chance in combatting and containing the outbreak. US and Taliban sign historic agreement

fter a week-long "reduction in violence," the US and Taliban signed a historic agreement Saturday which sets into motion the potential of a full withdrawal of US troops from Afghanistan and could pave the way to ending America's longest-fought war.

The agreement was signed in Doha, Qatar, by US Special Representative for Afghanistan Reconciliation Zalmay Khalilzad -- the chief US negotiator in the talks with the Taliban -- and Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar -- the Taliban's chief negotiator. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo witnessed the signing.

The "Agreement for Bringing Peace to Afghanistan" outlines a series of commitments from the US and the Taliban related to troop levels, counterterrorism, and the intra-Afghan dialogue aimed at bringing about "a permanent and comprehensive ceasefire."

"This is a hopeful moment, but it's only the beginning," Pompeo said at a news conference in the Qatari capital. "There's a great deal of hard work ahead on the diplomatic front."

The Taliban "will start intra-Afghan negotiations with Afghan sides on March 10, 2020," according to the text of the agreement.

The agreement lays out a 14-month timetable for the withdrawal of "all military forces of the United States, its allies, and Coalition partners, including all non-diplomatic civilian personnel, private security contractors, trainers, advisors, and supporting services personnel."

An initial drawdown to 8,600 troops would

occur within the first 135 days, according to the agreement. US officials have stressed that any downsizing of US troop presence would be "conditions based."



Speaking at the signing ceremony in Doha, Pompeo said the US "will closely watch the Taliban's compliance with their commitments, and calibrate the pace of our withdrawal to their actions."

"This is how we will ensure that Afghanistan never again serves as a base for international terrorists," Pompeo said.

President Donald Trump on Saturday told reporters at a White House news conference in Washington that he would be "meeting personally with Taliban leaders in the not too distant future" following the signing of the agreement.

Taliban leaders could meet Trump in the coming days or weeks, the group's spokesman told CNN. Muhammad Suhail Shaheen, also a member of the negotiation team, said the Taliban had accepted Trump's invitation for talks in the US. He said Trump had set the agenda for the meeting and "of course this will be shared with us through proper channel and we will have own opinion about that. And then it will take place."

CNN has reached out to the White House for comment

"We'll be very much hoping that they will be doing what they say they're going to be doing" under the agreement, Trump said at the briefing.

"Everybody wanted this to happen," Trump added.

Trump said he wanted congratulate those US officials involved in the agreement as well as his Afghanistan counterpart.

What the agreement says

The four-page agreement states that the Taliban will take steps "to prevent any group or individual, including al-Qa'ida, from using the soil of Afghanistan to threaten the security of the United States and its allies." Those steps include commitments that the Taliban will instruct its members "not to cooperate with groups or individuals threatening the security of the United States and its allies" and that it "will prevent any group or individual in Afghanistan from threatening the security of the United States and its allies, and will prevent them from recruiting, training, and fundraising and will not host them in accordance with the commitments in this agreement."

A senior administration official who briefed reporters last week acknowledged that "people are concerned about the historic relationship between the Taliban and al-Qai'da."

"We think this is a decisive and historic first step in terms of their public acknowledgment that they are breaking ties with al Qaeda. That's going to be a work in progress," they said.

The agreement also calls for the release of 5,000 Taliban prisoners and 1,000 "prisoners of the other side" on the first day of intra-Afghan negotiations.

"The relevant sides have the goal of releasing all the remaining prisoners over the course of the subsequent three months. The United States commits to completing this goal," the text states.

In a news conference following the signing, Pompeo said that, "if the Taliban do not uphold their commitments, Trump and his team will not hesitate to do what we must do to protect American lives."

While Pompeo was in Doha, Secretary of Defense Mark Esper was in Kabul, Afghanistan, on Saturday for a joint declaration ceremony with Afghan and NATO officials, including Afghan President Ashraf Ghani and NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg. Esper said that there is "great hope" about Afghanistan's future.

"Afghanistan deserves a chance to enjoy the security that comes from peace and stability, this will only happen if Afghans join together to embrace this opportunity," Esper said.

The signing of the US-Taliban agreement sees the realization of a campaign promise for Trump, who has sought to diminish US involvement in wars overseas.

"If the Taliban and the government of Afghanistan live up to these commitments, we will have a powerful path forward to end the war in Afghanistan and bring our troops home," Trump said in a statement Friday. "These commitments represent an important step to a lasting peace in a new Afghanistan, free from Al Qaeda, ISIS, and any other terrorist group that would seek to bring us harm."

The US has been at war in Afghanistan since 2001. Saturday's agreement in Doha came after more than a year of on and off negotiations with the militant group. The two sides had reached "an agreement in principle" in early September 2019, Khalilzad said at the time. Shortly thereafter, Trump called off the talks and said he canceled a secret Camp David



summit with the militant group after they took credit for a deadly attack in Kabul that killed a US service member.

In a surprise visit to Afghanistan in November, Trump announced that the talks had restarted. The US President made the announcement shortly after the Taliban released an American and Australian professor in exchange for the release of three Taliban prisoners by the Afghan government. The State Department announced in early December that Khalilzad had rejoined talks with the Taliban in the Qatari capital.

Members of Congress and regional experts had raised concerns about the deal prior to the signing. On Wednesday, Rep. Liz Cheney led a group of 21 other Republican lawmakers in expressing "serious concerns" about the anticipated agreement.

In a letter to Pompeo and Esper, they called for the full publication of the deal and wrote that they are "are seeking assurances that you will not place the security of the American people into the hands of the Taliban, and undermine our ally, the current government of Afghanistan."

A senior administration official said last week that "there are parts of this agreement that are not going to be public but those parts don't contain any additional commitments by the United States whatsoever," but rather they will contain "some confidential procedures for implementation and verification of the agreement itself."

Following its signing, Sen. Lindsey Graham, expressed mild support as well as some skepticism about the agreement.

"I am very suspect of the Taliban ever accepting the Afghan constitution and honoring the rights of religious minorities and women," the South Carolina Republican and staunch Trump ally, said. "Time will tell if reconciliation in Afghanistan can be accomplished with honor and security, but after more than 18 years of

war, it is time to try."

The text of the agreement does not contain any specific language regarding the protection of women or civil society.

In his remarks in Doha Saturday, Pompeo called on the Taliban to "embrace the historic progress obtained for women and girls, and build on it for the benefit of all Afghans."

"The future of Afghanistan ought to draw on the God-given potential of every person," Pompeo said.

The senior administration official told reporters last week that women will "have a seat at the table during the negotiations."

Those negotiations in March are likely to take place in Oslo, Norway, a second senior administration official said. The details are still being sorted out in terms of the negotiation's design, and who will specifically be at the table for the Afghan side.

There were a record high number of attacks carried out in Afghanistan last year by the Taliban and other anti-government groups. The violence in Afghanistan has continued this year, with the Taliban killing two US service members earlier this month.

The second senior administration official acknowledged last week that the path forward is not going to be "easy" or "perfect."

"It's not like the Taliban are endlessly evil or that this will bring flowers and roses and doves overnight," they said. "We and the Afghans have been in this conflict for decades. There are patterns of behavior, psychological views. People are going to have to begin making a big shift."

In AJK, the delegation held meetings with the President and Prime Minister of AJK, and visited the Line of Control (LoC) as well as a refugee

During its visit to the LoC at Chakothi, the delegation was briefed about the loss of civilian lives and damage to property due to frequent unprovoked firings by the Indian forces across the LoC. The Special Envoy emphasized that Kashmir and Palestine remained the top-most items on the OIC agenda. The two sides welcomed the Afghan peace deal signed between the US and the Taliban, and hoped that an inclusive and comprehensive Intra-Afghan dialogue would follow leading to

durable peace and stability in Afghanistan and the region.

Both sides agreed on the need to further capitalize on the positive trajectory of Pakistan-EU relations further strengthening the current political engagements and trade and economic relations.

US to send envoy to Saudi Arabia as Texas suggests oil output cut

he administration of United States President Donald Trump plans to send a special energy representative to Saudi Arabia, officials said on Friday. The White House is scrambling to respond to the global oil price crash as a regulator from the top US oilproducing state took the rare step of considering output cuts to help stabilise markets.

Oil prices have lost more than half their value in the last two weeks as Saudi Arabia and Russia kicked off a price war, and the coronavirus pandemic destroyed demand.

The crash has shocked the oil industry as a pact among OPEC and non-OPEC producers to cooperate imploded, triggering a production free-for-all. Texas regulators are considering the unusual step of intervening to curb output for the first time in decades, while the US is scrambling to negotiate with Saudi Arabia, which has unleashed production after years of touting its role as a stabilising force for markets.

Saudi Arabia and Russia are locked in a war for global oil market share after their three-year deal to restrain output collapsed this month. The kingdom has vowed to increase production to a record 12.3 million barrels per day and has

chartered numerous tankers to ship oil around the world, pushing prices to near 20-year lows

US officials believe Saudi Arabia's move to flood oil markets compounds the global economic crash at a time of a crisis caused by the pandemic.

A senior US Energy Department official will be sent to Riyadh for months to work closely with Department of State officials and the existing energy attache, the senior US officials told Reuters News Agency, on the condition of anonymity.

Trump administration officials said Saudi Arabia has, for decades, been a steadfast leader of stability in the global oil market. The energy representative would help the countries return to a path of stability, they said.

The price crash is also devastating to US oil producers, some of which have already begun putting employees on leave.

The hope is that Trump could negotiate with Saudi Arabia and Russia and convince them to match cuts with a similar cut in production in Texas, said Ryan Sitton, a commissioner with the Texas Railroad Commission, the body that regulates the state's oil and gas industry.

Sitton said production limits could be implemented quickly, though no one who works at the agency was around the last time the state limited production in the early 1970s.



"We need to take the time to hear from everybody," he said, adding that he was not yet advocating for the cuts. "[But] if we can help [Trump) get a deal done, then I think that's when we do something."

Sitton said in a tweet that he spoke with OPEC Secretary-General Mohammad Barkindo about an international deal "to ensure economic stability as we recover from" the coronavirus outbreak. Sitton said Barkindo was "kind enough to invite me to the next OPEC meeting in June".

Barkindo told Reuters that he and Sitton discussed their "perspective on current developments and the possibility of future cooperation" in a teleconference. Barkindo and OPEC ministers have, in the past, met with shale-industry executives at annual conferences.

Frank Fannon, the US assistant secretary of state for energy resources, said that to his knowledge, the federal government does not have the ability to restrict the Texas regulator from any work with OPEC to cut production. "Those are wholly within state matters ... from a federal level we have no ongoing engagements with OPEC, it's a cartel," Fannon told reporters late on Friday in a teleconference.

US industry unmoved

Some US industry representatives were sceptical that Texas should intervene in the


market. US oil producers have long resisted such a move, and the industry's largest trade association did not sound convinced Friday, either.

"Our view is simple. Quotas are bad," said Frank Macchiarola, senior vice president of policy, economics and regulatory affairs at the American Petroleum Institute. "They've been proven ineffective and harmful. There's no reason during this time to try to imitate OPEC."

In the last several years, shale operators using the innovative hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, technique, have boosted US oil output to nearly 13 million barrels per day, making it the world's largest producer. Since 2016, as OPEC restrained production, the US has taken market share from Saudi Arabia, Russia, and other nations.

Russia has been slower to come on board with OPEC's continued efforts to bolster prices, and the country's largest oil producer, Rosneft, has been an opponent of the deal with OPEC to cut supply. Units of that company, and its managers, were recently sanctioned by the US due to its trade relationship with Venezuela.

Trump administration officials will continue to reduce global oil output with sanctions on what the officials called bad actors in Iran and Venezuela, both of which are OPEC members, and their shipping networks, the officials said. To the extent that Russia is involved in marketing Venezuelan oil, it will be sanctioned, the officials said.

World must learn from China in epidemic battle, says expert

hina's experience and lessons, earned by overcoming the COVID-19 outbreak, will contribute to stemming the spread of the coronavirus across the world, says one expert.

"If China's experience and lessons are shared with the international society, it will contribute to prevailing over the COVID-19 outbreak early," Lee Hee-ok, a professor of political science at Sungkyunkwan University in Seoul, told Xinhua ahead of a Group of 20 (G20) video conference on Thursday.

"China has effectively enforced quarantine measures based on its experience and lessons learned from the outbreak of severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS)" back in 2003-04, Lee said.

The professor noted that although China's quarantine model may not be directly adopted by other countries, it could offer inspiration for those working to overcome their own outbreaks.

Furthermore, China could propose at the G20 quarantine steps that countries could jointly adopt to combat the virus' spread around the globe, the professor noted.

"An infectious disease is a common enemy that harms people around the world regardless of nationality and border," said Lee.

"It cannot be resolved by the power of a single country. Every country with a shared future in the fight against the infectious disease will join hands and form a single community," Lee noted.

He said each country will be required to minimize the economic fallout from the COVID-19 outbreak through cooperation.

Lee praised the World Health Organization (WHO), saying the global anti-epidemic body rapidly made public information on the COVID-19 to help the international community stay informed of the virus' spread.

The WHO also played an organizing role in combatting the COVID-19 outbreak by offering guidelines to contain the outbreak, he said.

Lee said G20 countries and other international organizations should respect science and the opinions of experts regarding quarantine measures, while refraining from political rhetoric and any attempt to pass the buck to someone else.

Lee said it would be wrong to call the COVID-19 outbreak the China or Wuhan virus because it would contradict WHO recommendations.

China ready to aid global virus combat

hinese President Xi Jinping said on Wednesday that China is ready to work with all other parties to step up coordination against COVID-19 and shore up confidence in the international community.

Xi made the remarks during a telephone conversation with German Chancellor Angela Merkel ahead of an extraordinary virtual summit of the Group of 20 (G20) leaders on a coordinated response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Chinese president noted that Merkel has expressed to the Chinese side sympathies and support, and the German government and various sectors in the country have extended their helping hand in the early days of the outbreak in China, saying that the Chinese people will remember that in their hearts.

Germany is now facing a serious challenge from the epidemic, and the Chinese people feel the same way, said Xi, adding that China firmly supports Germany in its fight against the epidemic and is willing to continue to provide assistance within its capacity.

He also said that the Chinese and German experts have already had video exchanges, and German experts have also travelled to China with the World Health Organization expert team, adding that China is willing to share prevention, control and treatment experience with Germany, strengthen cooperation in vaccine and drug research and development, and contribute to the health and wellbeing of both peoples and global public health security.

"May you lead the German people to overcome the epidemic as soon as possible," Xi said.

Viruses know no borders and are a common challenge faced by humanity, Xi said, adding that no country can stay out of or be immune from the epidemic.

In the battle against the outbreak, China and Germany, as well as China and the European Union (EU) have demonstrated the strength of solidarity and cooperation, and displayed positive energy, Xi said. Noting that the extraordinary G20 summit is about to be held, Xi said that the Chinese side is ready to work with all sides, including Germany, to step up coordination and speak with one voice to advocate the spirit of sharing the same boat and jointly fight the COVID-19 epidemic, so as to shore up confidence in the international community.

China sharing knowledge, resources to fight virus

rom sharing epidemic prevention and control experience to offering emergency medical aid, China has been actively promoting international cooperation in various fields to fight the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic with the rest of world.

The latest diagnosis and treatment plan, prevention and control plan and other technical documents have been compiled, translated and promptly shared with over 180 countries and more than 10 international and regional organizations, said Zeng Yixin, deputy director of the National Health Commission (NHC), at a press conference in Beijing.

He said that a meeting to share China's epidemic prevention and control experience was jointly held by the NHC and the WHO, which was attended by representatives from 77 countries and seven international organizations and was watched by over 100,000 people online. China has also established an online knowledge center in the field of epidemic control and clinical treatment, as well as an expert database for international cooperation, Zeng said, adding that nearly 30 technical exchange meetings have been held with more than 100 countries and regions by video links.

In the meantime, China has also provided assistance to 89 countries and four international organizations.

Chinese medical workers and supplies have been sent to 28 Asian countries, 16 European countries, 26 African countries, nine countries in the Americas and 10 countries in the South Pacific, Deng Boging, deputy head of the China International Development Cooperation Agency, said at the same press conference.

On the premise of fully ensuring domestic epidemic control, China has properly formulated its aid plan and offered assistance to other countries within its capability, Deng said. Noting China is facing rising risks of imported cases of the novel coronavirus disease, Deng said China's assistance to other countries is conducive to the global fight against the virus and will consolidate its hard-won achievements in containing the spread.

Chinese researchers' contributions were also recognized by the global scientific and technological community. For example, China shared the first completed genome sequence of the novel coronavirus on Jan. 11 and had built two platforms to share its scientific developments. One of the platforms, the 2019 Novel Coronavirus Resource (2019nCoVR) database, has recorded more than 4 million downloads by users from 152 countries and regions as of Wednesday, according to Vice Minister of Science and Technology Xu Nanping.





Xi hails WHO efforts to curb virus

hinese President Xi Jinping said he appreciates World Health Organization (WHO) Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus' efforts to advance the global battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.

BLUE ECONOMY: A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

Since the times immemorial, oceans remained an important contour in charting the discourse of human progress. Humanity's relation with oceans led to the development of many ancient civilizations. Livelihood largely remained associated with the seas and oceans as most of the commercial trade transit carried out through important waterways. How people can exploit and use the ocean based resources is evolving in significant ways for sustainable economy: an economic growth that sustains the natural resources and environment for future generations.

The shift from 'Brown' to 'Green' economy was profoundly felt necessary whence the former proved to be a destructive menace for the ecology and ecosystem in general. The industrial activities that our modern civilization depends upon, have raised atmospheric vulnerabilities and also played a pertinent role for bringing in the climate change (a result of natural causes, human activities, emission of greenhouse gases and changes in land use) which adversely affected the natural environment. As per the World Bank estimates, air pollution alone costs the global economy more than \$5 trillion every year. Moving farther to minimize the effects of brown economy on earth, the world in 2008 pledged to move towards an economy with cleaner energy systems that encapsulates the usage of energy more efficiently to reduce the vulnerabilities of the non-friendly environmental factors and ingress much better natural resource management systems to nurture the economic growth; such an economy is termed as 'Green'.

Meanwhile a book by Gunter Paul's, titled: "The Blue Economy; 10 years, 100 innovations, 100 million jobs" surfaced in 2010 bringing the concept of blue economy into the limelight. But the question here arises that what exactly the concept of blue economy addresses. As per the

Center for the Blue Economy, "it is the overall contribution of the oceans to economies, the need to address the environmental and ecological sustainability of the oceans, and the ocean economy as a growth opportunity for both developed and developing countries." The concept at its core refers to promote economic growth, social inclusion, and the preservation of livelihoods while at the same time ensuring environmental sustainability of the oceans and coastal areas. The oceans are increasingly becoming the source of food and energy which is pertinent for the existence of life on the planet Earth. Many economists have estimated an asset value of \$24 trillion to the ocean economy and as of now it's delivering something between \$4-500 billion each year in terms of the dividend to humanity.

People do understand that the oceans are not limitless and that they are suffering from increasing and often cumulative human impacts. And also the oceans that are not healthy and resilient are not able to support economic growth. The fact that oceans and seas matter for sustainable development is undeniable. An important challenge of the blue economy is to understand and better manage the various aspects of oceanic sustainability, ranging from sustainable fisheries to ecosystem. The second important aspect to highlight in this regard is realization of the effective management of ocean resources which requires collaboration across nation-states on different blue economic avenues and also synergy within various institutions of the nation-states.

Being an important maritime state in the Indian Ocean region, Pakistan is progressively apprehending the marvels of the Blue Economy. The country is blessed with approximately 1050 km long coastline and the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) covering about 240,000 sq. km. Pakistan's sea trade route contributes about \$66.5 billion dollars

to economic growth, accumulates 31% of Pakistan's GDP. Fish and seafood industry in Pakistan alone has the potential of generating the revenue of more than \$1.2 billion. Moreover, Pakistan's mangrove area, a sixth largest in the world, holds an annual value of about \$20 million which can be extracted from mangrove dependent fish species and shrimp industry. Whereas, Pakistan National Shipping Corporation which handles about 99% import of gasoline products holds a very small number of cargo vessels that only carries 7% of cargo to the world, while the remaining 93% is handled by foreign companies which produce foreign exchange of about \$1.5 billion annually. Such economic figures can contribute to overcome the economic instability of the country and put back the national economy on the success track. To optimally benefit from the country's maritime sector, there is a need for an integrated National Maritime Policy to effectively capitalize the ocean based dividends.

Need of an hour is to formulate an effective national compliance mechanism and synergize the institutional efforts to untap the blue economic potentials. Moreover, CPEC is a significant platform to play a pivot role in this regard as it has already put forward plans for the activation of ocean based activities in a bid to explore the incredible maritime avenues. Furthermore, Pakistan should embark upon boosting its economy while focusing on maritime infrastructure, technology for offshore resource development, a strong fisheries and marine leisure sector (tourism), environment issues etc. All the required financial and technological support should be geared up for building, operating, and making economically profitable industries. These are compelling reasons for Pakistan to endorse and internalize the concept of a Blue Economy in policy, bilateral relations as well as international transactions.

China says US officials making shameless comments on coronavirus data

hina's foreign ministry said on Thursday that US officials are making "shameless" comments casting doubt about China's reporting of coronavirus cases in the country.

Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Hua Chunying reiterated during a daily briefing that China has been open and transparent about the coronavirus outbreak that began in the country late last year, and said the United States should stop politicising a health issue and instead focus on the safety of its people. US President Donald Trump said on Wednesday the coronavirus statistics China was reporting seemed "a little bit on the light side", while his national security adviser said Washington had no way of knowing if Beijing's figures were accurate.

The comments came after a senior Republican lawmaker cast doubt on Beijing's data and Bloomberg News said a classified US intelligence report had concluded that China had under-reported the total cases and deaths it had suffered.

The coronavirus outbreak began in China in late

2019 but Beijing has reported fewer cases and deaths than in the United States, which now has the world's largest outbreak, with 215,000 confirmed cases and more than 5,000 deaths.

Trump told a daily briefing by his coronavirus task force that he had not received an intelligence report on China's data, but added: "The numbers seem to be a little bit on the light side — and I am being nice when I say that relative to what we witnessed and what was reported."

Trump said he had discussed how China had dealt with the coronavirus outbreak in a phone call with Chinese President Xi Jinping last Friday, but "not so much the numbers".

Trump, who has toned down his criticism of China's handling of the virus outbreak since the call, also said the US relationship with China was "very good" and both sides wanted to maintain multi-billion dollar trade deal reached earlier this year.

"As to whether or not their numbers are accurate," he added, "I am not an accountant from China."

Trump's national security adviser, Robert O'Brien, told the same briefing Washington was "just not (in) the position to confirm any of the numbers that are coming out of China."

"There's lots of public reporting on whether the numbers are too low," he said. "You got access to those reports that are coming out of Chinese social media ... we just have no way to confirm any of those numbers."

Earlier, Michael McCaul, the ranking Republican on the House Foreign Affairs Committee, accused Beijing of hiding the true number of those impacted. He said he had called for the State Department to investigate Beijing's "initial cover up and subsequent actions regarding this pandemic".

The Bloomberg report cited unidentified US officials as saying that a classified report, received by the White House last week, concluded that China's public reporting on cases and deaths was intentionally incomplete.

Japan's Abe admits postponing Tokyo Olympics may be option



ressure growing on Japan to delay summer games as Canada withdraws and Australia says preparing for postponement.

Canada has become the first country to withdraw its team from the Tokyo Olympics, increasing pressure on Japan's Prime Minister Shinzo Abe to delay an event he said for the first time on Monday could be postponed if it could not be held in its "complete form" because of the coronavirus pandemic.

After an emergency meeting on Sunday, the International Olympic Committee (IOC) said it was stepping up its "scenario planning" for the 2020 Games due to start on July 24, which would include a possible postponement.

Abe said that while cancelling the Games was not an option, a delay was now on the cards if that was the only way to hold the event in its complete form.

"If that becomes difficult, we may have no option but to consider postponing the Games." he told parliament.

He said he had conveyed his views to Tokyo Games chief Yoshiro Mori on Sunday evening, who then discussed the issue with IOC President Thomas Bach.

Opposition to holding the Games in July has risen sharply in recent days, with several important stakeholders such as the US Track and Field and UK Athletics, along with several national Olympic committees, calling for a delay because of the pandemic.

Late on Sunday, the Canadian Olympic Committee became the first country to withdraw from the Games, urging organisers to postpone the event for one year.

"While we recognise the inherent complexities around a postponement, nothing is more important than the health and safety of our athletes and the world community," it said.

The Olympics have never been postponed or cancelled during peacetime but the IOC's decision to even consider postponement was met with relief. The Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) welcomed the IOC decision on Monday and said athletes should now prepare for a Tokyo Olympic Games in the northern summer of 2021.

Preparing for postponement

In a statement, the AOC said its executive board "unanimously agreed that an Australian Team could not be assembled in the changing circumstances at home and abroad" and that athletes now needed to prioritise their own health and of those around them.

lan Chesterman, Australian Team Chef de Mission for Tokyo said the postponement of the Games would allow competitors from around the world to properly prepare with the hope the coronavirus crisis would be under control.

"It's clear the Games can't be held in July," he said. "Our athletes have been magnificent in their positive attitude to training and preparing, but the stress and uncertainty has been extremely challenging for them."

More than 13,000 people around the world have died since the coronavirus outbreak began in China late last year, with the epicentre now in Europe.

As of Sunday morning, Japan had 37 deaths and 1,055 coronavirus cases, excluding those from a cruise ship that was quarantined near Tokyo last month and returnees on chartered flights from China, according to public broadcaster

The IOC said it would finalise discussions on postponing the Olympic Games within the next four weeks.

Doctor's Note: How to do social distancing during coronavirus

oronavirus is a global crisis, and the situation is changing every day. I do ✓ not think I have ever quite experienced anything like it in my career, including when the swine flu pandemic hit in 2009.

Around the world, we are seeing the number of affected people rising rapidly. This has led to a whole host of different measures being implemented to try to get things under control. Some have worked well. Others, not so much.

In many countries, it seems that no matter what we try, the situation is worsening day-by-day.

So, am I panicking? Not yet. Even though things are serious, and we may feel helpless at times, there is still much we can all do to help mitigate things.

Two of the most important interventions, which you may already have heard of, are social distancing and self-isolation.

Every country has a slightly different policy when it comes to these, however, the general principles are similar.

Some people get the two confused, so here is an explanation, based on current UK practice.

What is social distancing?

Well, social distancing is the thing we should be

doing, and by we, I mean everyone.

Exact advice varies, but it does include things like: Working from home if possible; travelling only when necessary, especially on public transport or for overseas trips; avoiding social venues like cinemas and clubs; avoiding gatherings of large groups of people; restricting visitors; and, if you do go out in public, maintaining a safe distance from others - usually around two metres.

Since coronavirus is spread mainly through respiratory droplets (especially when people cough or sneeze), maintaining a bit of distance will help to decrease the spread of the virus.

Social distancing aims to reduce the amount of interaction people have while allowing them to carry out their necessary day-to-day activities. It also helps reduce the chances of picking the virus up and then spreading it to others.

These measures are especially important for people at higher risk of severe disease if they get coronavirus. This might include the elderly, especially those over 70, people with significant long-term medical problems like lung disease, heart disease, weak immune system, diabetes, neurological problems, kidney disease; and pregnant women.

How is self-isolation different?

Self-isolation is what people with possible

coronavirus have to do - if they have symptoms, or if they have been in close contact with someone who might.

It is usually reserved for those likely to be infected, to stop the disease spreading.

Self-isolation involves much more stringent and widened application of distancing practices such as: Not going to work or school; not travelling; not having visitors; not leaving the house and instead asking others to help if you need supplies; not sharing a bed; and not sharing household items like towels and utensils.

While social distancing is usually an ongoing practice over a long period of time, selfisolation is usually for a set period of time.

For example, in the UK, we recommend that people with symptoms self-isolate for a minimum of seven days. Their family members and others they have been in close contact with should self-isolate for a minimum of 14 days to allow for the incubation period and to see if they go on to develop the disease themselves.

As we learn more about the virus, this advice is likely to change. However, for now, it represents one of the most powerful tools we have in dealing with this global pandemic.

So let's make sure we all do our part.

Chinese scientists looking for Covid-19 treatment claim finding 'effective' antibodies

BEJING: A team of Chinese scientists has isolated several antibodies that it says are "extremely effective" at blocking the ability of the new coronavirus to enter cells, which eventually could be helpful in treating or preventing Covid-19.

There is currently no proven effective treatment for the disease, which originated in China and is spreading across the world in a pandemic.

Zhang Linqi at Tsinghua University in Beijing said a drug made with antibodies like the ones his team have found could be used more effectively than the current approaches, including what he called "borderline" treatment such as plasma.

Plasma contains antibodies but is restricted by blood type.

In early January, Zhang's team and a group at the 3rd People's Hospital in Shenzhen began analysing antibodies from blood taken from recovered Covid-19 patients, isolating 206 monoclonal antibodies which showed what he described as a "strong" ability to bind with the virus' proteins. They then conducted another test to see if they could actually prevent the virus from entering cells, he said.

Among the first 20 or so antibodies tested, four were able to block viral entry and of those, two were "exceedingly good" at doing so, Zhang said.

The team is now focused on identifying the most powerful antibodies and possibly combining them to mitigate the risk of the new coronavirus mutating.

If all goes well, interested developers could mass produce them for testing, first on animals and eventually on humans.

The group has partnered with a Sino-US biotech firm, Brii Biosciences, in an effort "to advance multiple candidates for prophylactic and therapeutic intervention", according to a statement by Brii.

"The importance of antibodies has been proven in the world of medicine for decades now," Zhang said. "They can be used to treat cancer, autoimmune diseases and infectious diseases." The antibodies are not a vaccine but could potentially be given to at-risk people with


the aim of preventing them from contracting Covid-19.

Normally it takes around two years for a drug even to get close to approval for use on patients, but the Covid-19 pandemic means things are moving faster, he said, with steps that would previously be taken sequentially now being done in parallel.

Zhang, who posted the findings online, hopes the antibodies can be tested on humans in six months. If they are found to be effective in trials, actual use for treatment would take longer. Other experts urge caution.

"There's a number of steps which will now need to be followed before it could be used as a treatment for coronavirus patients," Hong Kong University infectious disease specialist Ben Cowling said when the finding was described to him by Reuters.

"But it's really exciting to find these potential treatments, and then have a chance to test them out. Because if we can find more candidates, then eventually we'll have better treatment," Cowling said.






owruz is the Iranian New Year, also known as the Persian New Year, which is celebrated worldwide by various ethnolinguistic groups.




While Nowruz has been celebrated since the reform of the Iranian Calendar in the 11th






